INCLUSIVE EDUCATION POLICY

RATIONALE

Inclusive education is where all students are engaged in their learning and achieve by being present, participating, and belonging. This includes students of all abilities, cultures, ethnicities, religious beliefs, gender identities, sexual orientations, neurodiversity, ages, and socio-economic status.

At Ōtūmoetai Intermediate School, we value inclusive education and aim to provide our students with an environment and education that respects their dignity and individuality, and that challenges them to achieve personal standards and reach their full potential.

POLICY

As required by the Education and Training Act 2020, the school is inclusive of, and caters for, students with differing needs (section 127). In keeping with the national education and learning priorities (section 5), we aim to instil in our students an appreciation of:

- the importance of the inclusion of different groups and persons with different personal characteristics.
- diversity, cultural knowledge, identity, and the different official languages.
- Te Tiriti o Waitangī and Te Reo Māori.

Ōtūmoetai Intermediate School is committed to creating a school community where all members of our school community (staff and students) are welcomed, accepted and treated equitably and with respect regardless of their backgrounds or personal attributes such as race, language, religious beliefs, gender identity, disability or sexual orientation. This is so they can participate, achieve and thrive at school.

ACTIONS

To do this, we model and promote inclusive behaviour, language, concepts, and values at school.

We do this by:

- Acknowledging and celebrating the diversity of our students and staff.
- Modelling and promoting inclusive behaviour and language at school.
- Providing programmes and services, where possible, to meet the diverse needs of our students.
- Engaging with our students and their families to ensure that our school environment and programmes are safe and accessible for them, including:
 - identifying any support required, and any practical concerns;
 - discussing any concerns about the student's wellbeing and safety;
 - discussing the student's privacy and preferred level of information sharing;
 - Using the student's preferred name and pronouns;
 - Identifying any health and safety hazards for impaired students.

- Not tolerating any bullying behaviour.
- Analysing barriers to learning and achievement.
- Identifying students, and groups of students, who:
 - are not achieving, or are at risk of not achieving;
 - have learning support needs (including gifted students) and develop strategies to meet the needs of individuals and groups.
- Providing unisex toilets for both students and staff.
- Providing a uniform that meets the diverse needs of our students.

2022 KNOWLEDGEATHON

The PTA Knowledgeathon fundraiser is used to raise money for projects that directly benefit the students in each year. The money raised this year will be used to construct an entrance (waharoa) and bus shelter at the front of the school.

We are asking every student to raise at least \$10.00 in sponsorship. Our goal is to raise in excess of \$10,000.00.

How does it work?

During weeks 1 - 7 of term 2 the students will be learning the answers to 100 questions. During **week 7**, they will be tested on these 100 questions. The aim of this Knowledgeathon is for the students to learn the answers and get sponsorship per question answered correctly or a donation. The staff will mark the Knowledgeathon test and the students will receive their marked tests the following day.

Money collection can begin as soon as they have received their score. To be considered for individual prize draws and class prizes all money must be in by **Friday 1st July 2022 (week 9)**.

- Top class prizes (for money raised) and top-class prize for most perfect scores (100/100).
- Special effort prizes for outstanding individual effort.
- Top family prize (for money raised).

What happened to our last knowledgeathon money?

The school used the funds raised to upgrade sports equipment across the school and equip the science room for our new science programme.

TEACHER ONLY DAY REMINDER

A reminder that there is a NZEI/PPTA Accord Teacher Only Day on Thursday 14th April 2022 (attached to Easter and the School Holidays). Our school will be closed for instruction on that day. This Teacher Only Day is being held alongside our six contributing schools - Ōtūmoetai Primary School, Bethlehem School, Brookfield School, Bellevue School, Matua School and Pillans Point School.

UNIFORMS - WINTER TERM

Moving into the winter term, students may wear the black winter sports pants during Terms 2 and 3. Argyle Schoolwear is the authorised supplier of our school uniform and if people don't wish to buy these particular sports pants, then they should stay with the regular school uniform.

Girls are able to wear black stockings or pantyhose with their skirts. Scarves in school colours are also acceptable. Students may wear thermals under their polo tops. Black for the new uniform or grey for boys and white for girls if in the old uniform. Thermals should not be visible.



There is also our new grey sweatshirt or the black and green softshell jackets available from Argyle online. We will not accept incorrect jerseys, hoodies, sweatshirts or jackets. We have some of the old uniform jerseys and jackets at school for families who need assistance with these. Please note: Ōtūmoetai College apparel is not acceptable at our school.

The school's footwear requirements are able to be viewed on our website. Parents are reminded plain black leather shoes are recommended for winter. Black or white ankle socks can be worn.



Grooming

All students are expected to look natural in appearance. Hair must be natural in colour and appearance. (This means no unnatural colouring or hair dye). Long hair must be tied back during technology classes. No makeup or fingernail polish is permitted.

RAIN JACKETS AVAILABLE FOR ORDERING

We have the opportunity once a year to offer for sale to our school community a black rain jacket. This rain jacket is an add on to the school uniform and is only available to purchase once a year in term 1. This is an optional item and will not be available to order again until term 1 2023. It is waterproof with all the seams being sealed and the jacket is fleecy lined. By having a bulk order once a year we are able to get the jacket at a great price of \$55.00.

We have samples of this rain jacket and you are welcome to take a look at and have your child try it on. The rain jackets will be available in the sports office between 8:15am - 1:15pm until 25th March 2022. If you would like a rain jacket for your child please contact Leigh Gallagher on lgallagher@otuinter.school.nz.

If you would like your child to try a rain jacket on, please ask your child to see Mrs Gallagher in the sports office for a fitting. You are welcome to join your child. If you do not want to accompany your child for the fitting, Leigh will let you know what size is appropriate before confirming your order. She will err on the side of caution and recommend a size with room to grow.

The sizes available for fittings are: 9 -10 Child; 11 - 12 Child; 13 - 14 Child and S Adult.

Payment for this jacket is made directly to the school. It can be paid online to 12-3407-0029060-00. Please use your child's surname and 'Jacket' as the reference, or at the office by cash/EFTPOS.

Payment is due immediately once a rain jacket is ordered. If payment is not made we will not include your jacket with our order. **Orders close 14th April 2022 at 12:00 noon.**

HEALTH INFORMATION AT ŌTŪMOETAI INTERMEDIATE SCHOOL

What is Health Education About?

In health and physical education, the focus is on the well-being of the students themselves, of other people, and of society through learning in health-related and movement contexts.

(NZ Curriculum)

In health education, students develop their understanding of the factors that influence the health of individuals, groups and society. They will:

- Develop competencies for mental wellness and safety management.
- Develop understandings of nutritional needs.
- Build resilience through strengthening their personal identity and sense of self-worth, through managing change and loss, and through engaging in processes for responsible decision making.
- Learn to demonstrate empathy and develop skills that will enhance relationships.

Students use these skills and understandings to take critical action to promote personal, interpersonal and societal well-being.

(New Zealand Curriculum, page 23)

School-wide, we have an unrelenting focus on a culture of care and personal responsibility. All students have a right to a safe physical, emotional and social environment in which to learn and interact with their peers. This means everyone looking out for each other, showing respect for themselves and others and making safe choices.

For us, health education is also about enabling students to build life skills where they can identify unsafe situations in an increasingly complex world and know how to keep themselves safe.

Year 7 Programme

This is aimed at levels 3 and 4 of the New Zealand Curriculum. In this programme students will:

- Describe the characteristics of pubertal change and discuss positive adjustment strategies.
- Describe how social messages and stereotypes, including those in the media, can affect feelings of self-worth.
- Understand and describe constructive use of the internet and mobile technologies.
- Understand and discuss the potential impact of cyberbullying and online activities, thus preventing them becoming victims or perpetrators.

Parents will be invited to a meeting later in the year where resources used in this course will be shared and a discussion held.

Year 8 Programme

This is aimed at levels 4 and 5 of the New Zealand Curriculum. In this programme students will:

- Access and use information to make and action safe choices in the context of personal safety involving drugs and social interactions.
- Describe how social messages and stereotypes, including those in the media, can affect feelings of self-worth.
- Identify the effects of changing situations, roles and responsibilities on relationships and describe appropriate responses.
- Understand and describe constructive use of the internet and mobile technology.
- Understand and discuss the potential impact of cyberbullying and online activities, thus preventing them becoming victims or perpetrators.
- Recognise instances of discrimination and act responsibly to support their own rights and feelings and those of other people (link to Human Rights – Social Sciences).

Sexuality Education

During previous consultation with parents, our parents overwhelmingly felt that secondary school was the appropriate time to cover topics such as contraception, sexually transmitted diseases and other sexuality topics. We do, however, cover self-image in both Year 7 and 8, especially around the influences of media on individuals.

Keeping Ourselves Safe

The school uses a presentation to cover a range of Keeping Ourselves Safe topics at Year 8. This is delivered by Pat Buckley in a one-hour presentation. The presentation is called “Destination by Design”, Life Education that is real and relevant.

The content is all about making positive choices in all situation’s adolescents could find themselves in. Students are told “your life is like a book and you are its author. All choices have consequences that ripple out and touch others.”

76 pictures are used to address the following topics:

- drugs, including alcohol abuse;
- cyberbullying;
- responsible risk taking and not taking unsafe risks;
- choosing the right friends to keep you safe;
- staying involved in positive activities;
- being a good influence;
- learning from your mistakes;
- do the best you can;
- look after your family;
- don’t let your past shape your future.

We also use John Parsons from Citizen21 Ltd to present to all students around cyber safety. This year because of COVID-19, John carried this out via Zoom to all class rooms.

John Parsons

John Parsons is a Cyber Safety and Risk Assessment Consultant to education, health and private sectors, providing specialist advice and direction on the safe and ethical use of Digital Communication Technology. John has been awarded a Paul Harris Fellow by Rotary International for his work in child protection online and in the community.

John is the co-developer of cutting-edge cyber safety Internet Health Safety education now being delivered in Schools and to adult learning groups. He is a published author of “Keeping Your Children Safe Online” and a social commentator working through-out New Zealand and Internationally.

He promotes the rights of children to be judged fairly recognising their rights to use communication technology safely and with respect for themselves and others.

John’s sessions have been widely acclaimed nationally and by our Intermediate parents in previous years. He is highly recommended and parents will come away better equipped to assist their children on the internet.




INTERNATIONAL STUDENTS




TAURANGA CITY COUNCIL - FEEDBACK SOUGHT

It's time: your feedback is sought on key decisions for Tauranga.

Transforming the heart of our city, making rates fairer for everyone and sharing the cost of the growth are some of the key topics Tauranga City Council is asking people to share their views on over the next month. The proposals are set out in the consultation document for the proposed Long-term Plan Amendment 2021-2031 (LTPA) and draft Annual Plan 2022/23, which is open for community feedback until 26 April.

Key topics people are being asked to share their views on include:

- How we should implement the masterplan for the civic precinct - 'Te Manawataki o Te Papa' - to help revive the city's heart and create the experiences you would expect to find in a modern city.
- Proposed rates structure changes to ensure the commercial sector pays a fairer share of our total rates, particularly relating to transport costs.
- Using a new Government financing and funding approach for projects that would help address our inadequate housing supply and traffic congestion, funded by levies on the properties that benefit from these investments.
