


**Dear parents, caregivers, students and friends of the school.

On Thursday 7th July 2022, Parent-Teacher conferences will run throughout the whole day and will be of 15-minute duration. This is to allow parents to have quality discussions with the teacher around their child's learning and progress at school. We ask all parents to keep their child at home for the day except to accompany you to school for your meeting with the teacher. The school will be open to supervise any students who do not have alternative care arrangements.

Interviews will be booked through www.parentinterviews.co.nz. Students will be given information on 23rd June 2022 with detailed instructions on how to book interview times. This will include a unique booking code.

EMERGENCY MANAGEMENT INFORMATION FOR PARENTS AND CAREGIVERS

Key risks for our school	In addition to planning for events such as fires, earthquakes and pandemics, we also specifically plan for tsunami, flooding and armed intruders due to our location.
Incident Management Team	Henk Popping, Principal John Stanley, Deputy Principal and Acting Principal as required Richard Smith, Deputy Principal.
Preparing for and practising our plan	Activities and systems our school has in place to support emergency management planning and response: <ul style="list-style-type: none">• Board Meeting standing agenda items.• Staff meetings.• Staff induction processes.• Staff admin book.• Classroom emergency procedures at all entry and exit points.• Discussion with students about fire, earthquake, evacuation drills.• First aid training for staff and year 8 students.• Lockdown drills.
Emergency kit	Our emergency response kit is kept in the school office. It contains the following: <ul style="list-style-type: none">• Solar-powered radio.• Hand cranked and solar powered torches.• Evacuation key for school speaker system control box in foyer.• Emergency blankets.• First aid equipment.• Asthma emergency kit.• Bollard removal key for front gate. <p>Students with diabetes and or other medical conditions are encouraged to keep emergency supplies in their bags at all times in addition to their kit in the office.</p> <p>We also keep a supply of blankets and milo for students who need additional support.</p> <p>There is an Automated External Defibrillator available in our school foyer.</p>
Reviewing the plan	We will review our plan regularly as part of our Health and Safety procedures with at least one review a year.
Communication in an emergency	We will communicate with parents and caregivers in an emergency through the following: <ul style="list-style-type: none">• E-text.• Email.• Facebook.

	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> If internet, mobile and phone lines are down we will communicate through local radio stations. <p>All communication will come from the school Principal or the Board of Trustees chairperson.</p>
Authorised persons to uplift your child	<p>We will only release children to parents, caregivers and emergency contacts already approved by the parent/caregiver for that purpose.</p> <p>Parents and caregivers are reminded each term to update their child's information if things have changed.</p> <p>Students will not be permitted to leave the school site without a designated parent, caregiver or emergency contact person.</p>
Evacuations	<p>The school has an evacuation process where all students, staff and visitors move quickly to the top field beside the bottom astroturf.</p> <p>We use the school speaker system to communicate evacuation alarms or to initiate a lock down.</p>
Shelter in place and lockdown	<p>In the case of a lockdown, students and teachers will shelter in their own classrooms or the nearest classroom / school building if outside. Doors will be locked, blinds drawn and students asked to sit under their desks out of visual sight.</p> <p>Parents and caregivers:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> If we need to bring everyone inside in a lock down, with the exception of emergency services, we won't be letting anyone in to the school once we have shut our doors. Please wait for information and instruction from us and do not come to the school until asked to do so, even if it is the end of the day. Arriving when we are still managing an emergency could put you, your child and our staff at risk. We will continue to provide the very best care we can to keep your child as safe as possible. If needed and when it is safe to do so, we will ask you to come and collect your child. For some shelter in place events, there won't be any need for your child to be picked up as the school will continue as normal after the event has ended. <p>In the case of an earthquake, fire, flooding or tsunami, a decision will be made regarding the safest place for students, staff and visitors to gather / shelter.</p>
Reunification process	<p>Our reunification process following an emergency event is as follows:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> Students are to remain on our school site, supervised by teaching and support staff. Parents will be kept informed regarding our emergency event and if required asked to pick up their child from school. We have up to date class lists and parent contact details in an emergency folder held at the office. This will be used to tick off students as they leave with their parent or designated emergency contact person. <ul style="list-style-type: none"> If our school site has no safe place for shelter, we will move everyone off site to a safe shelter and advise parents accordingly.

	<p>The school will continue to supervise and care for students whose parents / emergency contacts are unable to pick them up and will do so until all students have been safely reunited with their families.</p>
Supporting children after an emergency event	<p>Support for students following an emergency event:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none">• We will provide your child with age-appropriate information about the event.• We will monitor all children to identify if there are any wellbeing concerns.• If you have any concerns about your child please speak with us. We have support mechanisms we can access to provide you and your child with the help you need.

PARKING/DRIVING AROUND OUR KURA

The Ōtūmoetai Intermediate School area will be visited regularly by Travel Safe, TCC Parking and Police to help maintain safety for all children using the area. Please remember to practise safe parking behaviour, obey the road rules, and choose safety over convenience.

Please note a new Tauranga City Council Traffic Camera is monitoring both Charles Street and Windsor Road for parking infringements.

A friendly reminder:

- Bike, walk, scooter to school to help reduce congestion - be fit and healthy.
- Not to stop or park on yellow lines.
- The school car park is not a safe area to park during pick up and drop off times.
- Not to double park alongside other vehicles to pick up and drop off students.
- Park safely. Parking on grass verges can make it difficult for students to see and be seen.
- Pre-plan a meeting place with your son/daughter away from school to help reduce congestion.
- Recommended parking is on Queen Street, Ngatai Road, Margaret Road, the bottom end of Anne Road.
- Drivers – stop at the pedestrian crossing if there are people waiting to cross.
- Pedestrians -please ensure vehicles have stopped in both directions before stepping out on the crossing.
- When school road patrols are operating please pay attention to their instructions.



ANNUAL FOOD BANK APPEAL 2022

This term, our school is going to participate in the annual School Appeal for our community Foodbank. Our official appeal dates are in week seven, from Monday the 13th June to Friday the 17th of June. A box will be delivered to each classroom to fill. In the last year, Tauranga Food Bank gave out enough food for more than 220,300 meals helping 18,365 people in our community with food, 9,794 of these people were children.

The Foodbank is made up of 60 volunteers and they have given more than 13,000 hours of volunteer work in the last 12 months to run the Foodbank. This is a very worthwhile cause and a great opportunity for us to give to our community and show care and kindness. The people in our community who get support from our foodbank are very grateful for your generosity.

A little goes a long way:

You won't see it, but you can make a huge difference in the lives of people in need. Your donations will send kids to school with breakfast and lunch and provide evening meals for families feeling financial pressure.

The Foodbank relies on your generosity to ensure families throughout Tauranga have something to put on the table. It doesn't have to be a lot, everything is used and nothing goes to waste.

Every Donation Helps:

Every week, thousands of New Zealanders rely on food parcels. Sadly there is often not enough in the food banks, to meet everyone's needs. Every donation big or small helps to make a huge difference in our community.

We have 927 students and 79 staff members. Imagine the impact we could make as a school, if we all participated in this and gave a little something.

The Foodbank has a wish list, they need food items that do not perish. They suggest things like; tinned soup, tinned fish, long-life milk, creamed corn, canned vegetables, cereals like cornflakes, Weet-bix and rice bubbles. Toiletries like soap and baking supplies such as cocoa, icing sugar and flour.

All of these things last a long time and can be stored on a shelf and don't need to be refrigerated.

If you are bringing things from home, please check the use by date hasn't expired and all food items must be sealed and not have been opened.

Below are some suggestions on food items which the Food Bank are running low on and always need:

- Baked Beans
- Tinned Fish
- Tinned Soup or Cup of Soup
- Pasta
- Baking Supplies (Cocoa, icing sugar, flour, chocolate chips, etc)
- Cereal (Weetbix, Cornflakes)
- Peanut Butter and Jam
- Large size nappies (over 16kg), wet wipes
- Milo
- Toilet Paper
- Toothbrushes

Don't stress if your donated item isn't on the above list – we will make use of all that we receive, and you are certainly making a difference.



STUDENTS GOING ON HOLIDAY DURING TERM TIME

We are noticing the increasing number of families who are removing their child from school to travel on holiday during term time. This practice is not condoned and we draw your attention to the following Ministry of Education website:

Making sure your child attends school every day

Going to school every day is really important if children are to achieve and succeed. As parents and carers, it's up to you to make sure your child attends school every day, from when they first start school until they are 16.

Does my child have to go to school every day?

Yes, your child must go to school every day. Under the Education Act 1989, parents and carers of school children up to 16 years old can be prosecuted if their child is away from school without a good reason.

Why do they need to go every day?

Going to school every day really is the key to getting the best out of school because:

- it sets up good habits for going to school right from day one;
- learning to read, write and do maths takes a lot of practice and is easier to master if your child goes to school regularly;
- each day is a chance to learn something new;
- school offers your child regular, dedicated help to master the many skills they need;
- it teaches your child life skills like commitment, being reliable, having a good work ethic and sticking with things when they get hard.

What if my child needs to be away from school?

Your child should go to school every day, but sometimes they might need to be away from school because they are too sick to attend, have an appointment or need to be at a tangi or funeral.

If your child is going to be away from school you should let the school know as soon as possible. Check what your school's process is for letting them know about absences. You will need to let them know that your child will be away, why and for how long.

Your child's safety and wellbeing is a priority for the school. If your child doesn't turn up to school they will be concerned for their safety. If the school doesn't hear from you, they will get in touch with you to make sure your child is okay.

Can I take my child out of school during term time to go on holiday?

No, a holiday is not a good enough reason to take your child out of school, so holidays should be planned outside of term time. Events like a birthday or a special day's shopping aren't considered valid reasons for being away from school either.

What if my child is often off school sick?

If your child misses a lot of school because of a serious illness you may be able to get help from a regional health school. There are three regional health schools, based in Auckland, Wellington and Christchurch. Together they service the whole country, including remote areas. The teachers can work with children both at home and in hospital. You can contact them directly:

Does my child have to attend religious teaching or sex education at school?

No, these are times when your child doesn't have to legally attend lessons - you can ask for your child to be exempt from religious teaching or sex education lessons.

What can I do to make sure my child is going to school?

The key here is to make school the priority. There are things you can do at home, and things you can work side by side with the school on.

At home

- talk to your children about why it is important to go to school every day – ask them what they want to be in the future. Their education is the key to doing well in life
- be positive about school;
- set good habits about going to school from day one;
- prepare your children the night before school - make sure they have done their homework;
- have a good morning routine that gets them to school on time, relaxed and with everything they need;
- don't let them have the day off just because they would rather be at home;
- keep absences due to sickness to times when your child is actually sick - don't keep them at home when you know that they are just nervous about school – talk to the school who can help your child overcome this;
- know about your child's school life - ask questions, listen to your child. This will make it easier to pick up on any issues they might be having;
- keep family holidays outside of term-time, as every day at school is an opportunity to build skills, and repetition is critical for learning – especially for primary school children;

- don't overload them – school may be exhausting for your child so make sure they have some downtime after school to relax and have a break.

Working with the school

- build a strong relationship with the school and teachers to improve communication – it's easier to talk to them if a problem arises;
- get involved with the school - volunteer for parent help, go on school trips, help out on the PTA. It helps you to get to know the teacher and the school, and it shows your child that you prioritise their schooling;
- learn your school's process for letting them know about absences, and contact them as soon as you know your child is not going to be at school that day;
- talk to the teacher or principal if your child is reluctant to go to school, and work together to problem solve.

What can I do if my child refuses to go to school?

This can be really upsetting. Talk to your child about why they don't want to go. Be supportive. There may be a reason, like:

- not getting on with some of the other children;
- bullying;
- feeling too much pressure in their learning;
- a health issue, like wetting their pants;
- a problem with their teacher or other staff member.

Talk to your child's teacher or principal straight away. Whatever the reason, you won't be the first parent to talk to the school about that type of situation. Your school will have some good advice, and you'll be able to work together to help your child. If you have a really serious concern about a teacher or other staff member, or suspect your child is in danger you can contact the Ministry of Education, the New Zealand Education Council or the New Zealand Police.

Every day counts towards your child's learning.

Please Note:

The school position is that our teachers should not be expected to provide additional work for the student on holiday either before or after the holiday period. It is up to the holidaying child to catch up to the rest of their peers when they return to class.





Take me to the future: Ōtūmoetai 2050

Planning ahead to make sure we have enough homes, suitable ways to get around, and community spaces to support the wellbeing of everyone who lives here.





Thank you to everyone who told us what you'd like to see in the future in Ōtūmoetai, Matua, Brookfield, Bellevue and Judea.

Using your feedback collected from March to April this year, we have now prepared a draft plan to support the wellbeing of these communities over the next 30 years.

Why we need a plan

Tauranga is growing quickly, and the suburbs of Ōtūmoetai, Matua, Brookfield, Bellevue and Judea will see big changes over the next 30 years.

Our city is projected to grow by around 78,500 residents by 2063 and will need approximately 34,400 new homes to be built.

Growth will occur across our city, but particularly on the Ōtūmoetai Peninsula because its central location, proximity to the water, green spaces, and commercial/retail centres make it a great place to live.

Following central government direction, we need to enable more housing to be built at greater densities (number of homes per hectare) and heights across our existing urban areas. We are keen to get your feedback on where this growth occurs in your community and how we support that growth.



What you told us:

Key themes:

- neighbourhoods need to be well connected to other neighbourhoods and also connect to commercial/retail centres
- commercial/retail centres must be accessible for everyone, pedestrian-friendly and safe
- walking and cycling routes need to be made safer
- public transport should be more efficient, and frequent, with more sheltered bus stops
- public amenities should be provided to meet the needs of the community and parks upgraded to make them more useable and enjoyable.
